



Did you know?

The Origin of CUPE Local 5167

In July 1918, City of Hamilton outside employees are chartered as the <u>Civic Employees Union</u>

<u>Local 16208</u> under the American Federation of Labor (AFL). The Local's first president was William Nolan.

Could you imagine?

In 1933 Hamilton civic workers accept a 10% overall wage cut; 5% is restored in 1936, and the remaining 5% in 1937. Workers are given six paid statutory holidays and have to work a 44-hour week with the exception of the cemetery department, which works 48 hours a week.

Last Strike!

On July 11 1973, Local 5's garbage workers walk off the job; Local 167 workers join them on July 30. Board of Education workers also join the picket lines. The strike lasts until September 17. The main issues are wage parity with Toronto civic workers and a cost-of-living allowance that would help wages keep up with runaway inflation.





Francis Orvell (F.O.) (Frank) Rogers – Helped make 5167 today!

F.O. Rogers was at the forefront of the creation of CUPE Local 5167. In April 1956, The Trades and Labour Congress and the Canadian Congress of Labour merged together to become the Canadian Labour Congress (CLC). This was a historical step bringing all unions under one umbrella organization. It didn't take long after that the spirit of cooperation spread out to the two public sector unions. Both the National Union of Public Service Employees (NUPSE) and the National Union of Public Employees (NUPE) felt the time had come to merge into one union representing all public employees.

With the blessing of the CLC a Unity Committee was formed with representatives from both unions. I will not go into detail of all the names, but on the NUPSE side was Stan Little and Frank Rogers from Local 5. The first Unity Committee meeting took place in Toronto on July 17th and 18th, 1956.


Roger's determination and dedication are demonstrated by his serving as Vice-President of the National Union of Public Service Employees (NUPSE) and his participation in the merger discussions between NUPSE and the National Union of Public Employees (NUPE).

These discussions which began in 1956, were not completed until 1963 with the result being the merger into the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE); Canada's largest union, and remains the largest union today. Stan Little, the first President of CUPE observed that while a lot of people came and went Frank Rogers was there from day one until the merger into CUPE was complete. Indeed, Little considers Rogers to have been a vital player for NUPSE, one who knew just which questions to ask.

At the September 24th, 1963 CUPE's founding convention in Winnipeg the total membership was 78,000 and has grown to 665,000 members in 2018. Pat Lenihan, NUPE, compares the merger in 1963 that created CUPE to helping a large, full-term infant prepare for its inevitable birth.

Members of CUPE Local 5167 should be very proud knowing that Francis Orvell Rogers, a past member of our local was instrumental in sowing the seeds that helped build CUPE into the strong and largest Union that it is today.

Unity remains at the very core of the labour movement.






