In his own words

Hi Union Brothers and Sisters. I've been asked to write about myself, apart from my job as an equipment operator at the Royal Botanical Gardens.

I was born in Hamilton, a set of triplets with my two sisters, and raised on a dairy farm in Copetown. I attended school in Ancaster; and went on to attend the University of Guelph.

While at University, I saw an ad in a farm paper about becoming an auctioneer. I applied and this changed my life greatly. I attended many livestock and farm sales. I was now in the auction box as an auctioneer! I was employed with various livestock barns throughout Ontario and travelled extensively.

The milk tester on my family farm asked if I was interested in working for the Dairy Herd Improvement Corporation. I applied and worked in Waterloo County for 24 years.

In 2005, I changed careers obtaining my heavy equipment certifications and AZ licences. I'd seen a job opening in Conservation at the RBG, which I applied and became a bio technician in this department in 2009. I work as an equipment operator, with gardeners, special events teams, and the public.

Erin is one of our Union Stewards at Good Shepherd Women's Services, she is very excited to continue learning about this role and supporting her co-workers while building support for the union in the workplace.

When I asked Erin why she wanted to work at an Emergency Women's Shelter Erin **explained:** "I had been involved in activism for a long time in the community before working at the shelter. I had always been interested in social justice and equity. I had volunteered with SACHA, participated in rallies and protests and started projects that focused on mental health, community support, and substance use. I was less confident that I would be able to secure a position as a case manager. I enrolled in school part time so that I could work as a housekeeper and then 'beef up' my skills as a case manager. I live now by the idea that you need to apply for the jobs you want, because you definitely won't get them if you don't."

Why do you enjoy your role as a Front Line Case Manager? " I like working in this role because it's a challenge. I love talking to people about what their options are and providing them a place where they can talk about change. I like being able to support women in navigating all the various systems to be able to reach their goals. Homelessness is a complicated issue, but at the same time, it's simple. I think about all the vacant buildings in Hamilton and how easy it would be to build something on that land that would support homeless individuals in our communities. Instead we are seeing an increase in the criminalization of poverty, rental increases, and an increase in pricey condos being built all over the city. If we want to end homelessness, we need to make it a priority for our city. We need to build systems and programs that support those in poverty in the city and places that are affordable to those with lower incomes."

In Erin's spare time she loves to play music. Prior to joining us at Good Shepherd Women's Services she went to college for a Bachelor of Contemporary Music degree. Erin had ambitions to be a musician, but in the end realized that she enjoyed playing music for herself, you might see her play a show downtown. Erin enjoys doing yoga, listening to live music, and dancing in her spare time.

Flash from the Past President – by Ed Thomas, 5167 Retiree and Activist

William Hugh Lochaber Fraser, born May 1, 1908, started working for the city during the depression as a garbage man.

Fraser and his family were very poor and lived in a rented house on Emerald St. N. They couldn't even afford to buy coal. During this time there were numerous dumps along Burlington St. and Fraser used to go down and gather sacks of peach pits that had been dumped by a local canner. He would burn these pits in the furnace to substitute for the coal he could not afford. Two of his daughters died two years apart from pneumonia as a result of living in that cold draughty house on Emerald St.

Prior to 1943, Fraser was Recording-Secretary of the Union and in 1943 he became the president of Hamilton Civic Employees Union (CCL). Fraser used to live, sleep and eat Union and was an adamant CCF (prelude to the NDP) supporter.

During the strike of 1950, Fraser was on the picket line continuously; although he was poor he would not accept strike pay. His philosophy was that there were other men with bigger families that needed the money more than he did and as a result his family went without on numerous occasions.

During 1950 CCL Convention, Fraser took to the stage to address the delegates about Local Five's strike. He had a large patch on his trouser, seeing this delegates burst into laughter. Fraser being a proud man turned to the delegates and said "You can laugh if you want, but the reason I'm here and why I'm a Union man is because I've got a patch on my pants." He continued by saying that we are here to **better the lot of the working man,** so they don't have to have patches on their pants. President Fraser received a standing ovation from the delegates of the convention.

Fraser died April 2, 1983.

The federal Liberal government is in discussions with the provinces and territories for a new Health Accord. This is the time to pressure the government to negotiate a Health Accord that protects, strengthens and expands our public health care system. We need our federal government to:

- Negotiate a new 10-year Health Accord with the provinces
- Pay a fair share of provincial health care costs at least 25%
- Stop privatization and extra-billing, and enforce the Canada Health Act
- Increase investments in not-for-profit community care, home care and longterm care for our seniors
- Establish a national, universal and public drug plan a new Pharmacare program

Rising Food Prices


The overall cost of basic consumer goods in Canada may seem to be rising slowly, but increased food prices mean the cost of living is shooting up faster for many people.

Anybody who's shopped for groceries recently has been hit with sticker shock. Prices rising up to \$10 for a cauliflower and \$5 for celery in major cities in January are some of the most extreme examples. Overall, prices for fresh fruit and vegetables rose 13 per cent in 2015. In 2015 families faced beef price increases of up to 30 per cent, and double-digit increases for other foods, like pasta.
