March 2022 marks the two-year anniversary of a journey we never thought we would know or live through. COVID-19 known as the Coronavirus began to spread as we were all glued to our TV's, listen to

our radios and scrolled through the endless posts on social media of this deadly disease.

Waiting, praying, and hoping that it would not reach us. We watched anxiously as the virus got closer and closer and ultimately the inevitable happened, it ravaged throughout the globe until it was at our front doorsteps. For the first time in our lives, we were in the face of a terrible pandemic, that was taking lives all around the world, we were not prepared, it plagued our most vulnerable people, overwhelmed our hospitals and nursing homes.

The government shut down our cities and locked us down in our homes. Our once busy streets and roads were empty and



no children could be playing in the parks, they too were on lockdown. Schools, and businesses were forced to close down in an attempt to keep people safe. Healthcare workers were our HEROS... Doctors, Nurses, and PSW's were the backbone from the start of this pandemic and our only hope to take care of our loved ones.

Long term care homes were impacted the greatest in Canada between March 2020 in February 2021. More than 80,000 residents and staff were infected with COVID-19, resulting in 14,000 deaths.

While the world stopped and people were forced to stay home, health care workers were driving those lonely, empty streets to work every day praying their workplace wasn't in an outbreak today. Wondering what today would bring? What challenges would we face, hoping we had the proper PPE ... and what was the proper PPE? What were restrictions going to be? What would those restrictions mean? How would this affect our work? Will we have enough staff? Will I get sick at work? How will this affect my family? How do we go to work when schools and childcare centres are closed?

Many of us coming home and getting changed in the basement, the garage, or even the back porch so that we didn't bring the virus into our homes, to our families. We were completely isolated from our husbands, wives and children so we could keep our family safe. Anxiously, tirelessly working every day short staffed and fearing the unknown, or what will happened next.

Being short staffed is nothing new in long term care, we have been fighting for years for the Time to Care Campaign so we can provide dignity and compassion to our most vulnerable people as they depend on us for everything that most of us take for granted. Our residents need varying level of support to be able to



use the washroom, eat a meal, and to get washed and dressed. For us these are the simplest activities of daily living, but an impossible task for our residents. They depend on us for all of it.

Working short staffed and 16 hour shifts just to provide and care for our residents, wearing layers of PPE, goggles, masks, gowns, and gloves trying to do the very best we can.

Residents in lockdown not able to see their

family and friends. Staff becoming stressed, burnt out and overwhelmed, seeing no end in sight.

We were the first to be vaccinated in December 2020, no one knew the possibilities of this vaccine or how it would affect us, health care workers proudly took their vaccine to keep everyone safe. PCR testing and rapid swabs being done almost every day since the start of this pandemic, each time hoping for a negative result.

Then here comes our Premier Doug Ford implementing Bill 124 and Bill 195 to limit wage increases and infringing on our collective bargaining rights concerning vacation, schedules and work.

I have seen the strengths of many of my peers supporting each other from all departments at the Lodges. Nurses, personal support workers, housekeeping, dietary, screening and even management trying our best every day to comfort worried minds and encourage one another. To



support our residents as they too were suffering the loss of close contact with their loved ones.

My message today is to not forget the people who were and still are a very important part of what got us through this pandemic. We need to continue to support one another, give words of encouragement and to be kind to one another. Just simply to do the best that we can every day.

CUPE National and CUPE Ontario UPDATES

CUPE extends our solidarity to the people of Ukraine, who are now living in fear of military violence and occupation after Russia attacked their country. We further extend solidarity to the people in the streets of Russia opposing this dangerous escalation of violence and act of war.

To health care and emergency service workers, journalists and all the workers who will continue to do their jobs despite the risk, we support you.

CUPE calls on the Canadian government to make every effort to de-escalate this situation. We support and encourage solutions leading to peace. Efforts to support people fleeing war and who want to come to



Canada are critically important right now. These measures must be applied to all countries caught up in unjust wars and the suffering they bring.

CUPE solidarity extends beyond borders. We are committed to supporting the workers and people of Ukraine, and the anti-war activists in Russia, until a peaceful solution is realized.

CUPE Ontario represents 125,000 of OMERS 289,000 active plan members. The union has been calling for an independent and transparent review of OMERS, led by worker and employer sponsors, since OMERS made public its 2020 results showing a return of -2.7%, or a loss of \$3 billion, even as other large defined benefit pension plans and funds posted substantial



investment gains during the same time frame. A new report examining executive compensation at the Ontario Municipal Employees Retirement System (OMERS), released February 25, 2022 by CUPE Ontario, reinforces the urgent need for an independent review of the pension plan. The report, "High Pay, Low Returns: Why are OMERS Executives Paid So Much?"

The Amalgamation of the City of Hamilton we know took place in December 2000. The amalgamation was forced on all the communities by the Mike Harris, conservative government.

Doug Lychak was hired as the City Manager for over a quarter of a million-dollar salary!! He had worked for the Region back in the 70's before moving on to work for the cities of Mississauga ON, Edmonton AB, and Surrey BC. In Edmonton, he was involved in the downsizing of public services that resulted in the loss of 3000 jobs! Doug Lychak was no stranger to controversy, in fact he received numerous threatening telephone calls and his house was once firebombed!! He was known by nicknames such as the NOTORIOUS SLASHER, the AXE MAN the HATCHET MAN.

In 2001, his job for Hamilton was to cut 25 million dollars out of the budget. What did that mean for the members of then CUPE Locals 5 and 167? Job loss! A joint effort by CUPE Locals 5, 167, 1220 and 1006 began, they stood up to fight for their jobs and city. The name of the joint union committee was the Municipal Unions Coordinating Committee or MUCC. Billboard ads sprung up all over the Region, radio ads ran nonstop, leaflets were printed and there were even bumper stickers!

We now have the Ford conservative government that has been attacking workers since they took office. After being elected, Ford passed Bill 124 to limit wage increases for public sector workers at 1%, while he gave his government a 14% wage increase the week before.

During the pandemic Ford praised essential workers as heroes, but enacted Bill 195 to trample and supersede Collective Agreements! Ford says one thing and then acts contrary to his words. He cut retail workers statutory holidays from 8 to 3, he passed legislation to allow landlords to evict people that cannot afford to pay their rent. He pushes for privately owned long-term care homes over public long term care

homes. Everyone knows how that has been failing our most vulnerable!! The levels of neglect and abuse at privately owned LTC homes was exposed by COVID.

Rest assured he will use the pandemic to justify cutting deeper to wages, healthcare, education, and transfer payments to municipalities! Where do you think this billion-dollar plate return money is coming from? He will continue to try to distract you will a quick cash grab to push his agenda to bust unions and cut services.

Tell Ford to pack his bags on June 2, 2022, and PROTECT OUR PUBLIC SERVICES!
